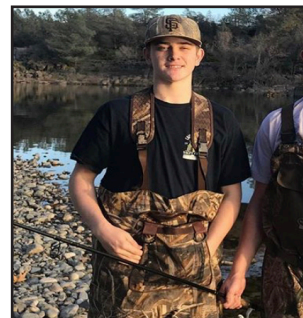

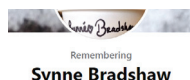
Skyline College Scholarship

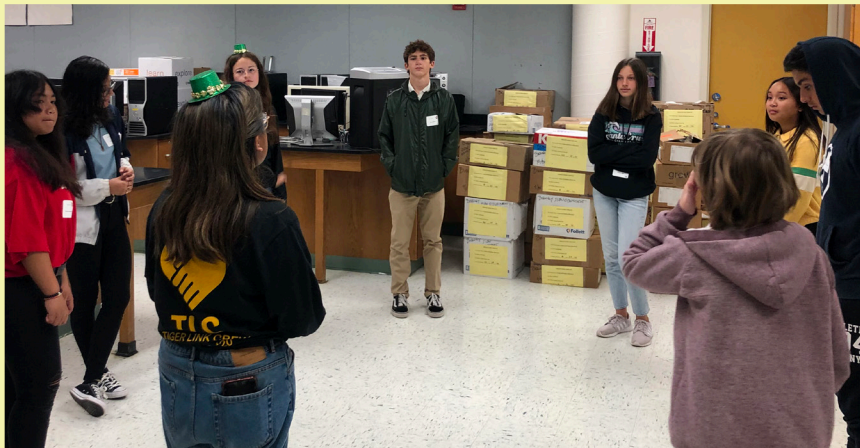
